3. p. 13 GBS and HGW :-) cf p. 15 'a man has to make his own way....' cf 19 responsibility (individual and soc)

Lang : knighthood, infirmary = hospital; disinfectant = eg Do-Mes-tos

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impertinent - unverschämt

offence - *Straftat*, *Delikt*.....(difference?) offensive - *anstössig*, z B (*anzüglich*, ...) to offend somebody = *jemanden beleidigen*

vindictive - rachsüchtig dubious - uncertain impressionable - easy to influence

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short-handed - nowadays many firms are short-handed, there aren't enough people to work there cf heavy-handed - kind or unfair or insensitive

to think better of something
to turn in
to amount to much
to lose one's temper
